The affiliating university designs the curriculum. A large number of faculty members are members of the university Board of Studies for UG as well as PG. Suggestions are made by them and are usually incorporated.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Efforts are made to teaching learner centric and interactive. Regular classroom is supplemented by having class discussions, quiz tests, assignments, guest lectures, seminars and group discussions.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The semester/annual exams are conducted and evaluated by the affiliating university. The college conducts MSTs and house examinations. Teachers submit the awards within the stipulated time to the registrar after showing the answer sheets to the students and guiding them to score better. Monthly class tests are also conducted by teachers.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

Faculty members are encouraged to undertake research work. They are given duty leave to attend seminars and conferences organised by other institutions, or to make presentations. Some college teachers are also guiding research work of Ph.D. and M.Phil. scholars from other institutions.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

There are around 55000 books in the college library. Computerisation of access to the library is in the process.

The college has subscribed to INFLIBNET's N-List program of online journals and books.

A congenial atmosphere ensures maximum output from employees and also generates satisfaction.

To make the administration decentralised all faculty members are involved in developmental activities of the college and carrying out academic and extra-curricular duties. The aptitude and ability of the faculty members is kept in mind while assigning various duties.

  - 1. Psychological and behavioural counselling: The psychology department conducts a counselling workshop for students and staff to identify and address any psychological issues.
  - Health Awareness Activities: Health camps are organised regularly to spread awareness about health among girls. This year Ricela Oil Company updated students on latest research on cooking oils. Food stalls were put up on World Food Day.
